The guidelines outline the details for preparation and submission for a presentation at the National Health Outreach Conference (NHOC).

I. SUBMISSION DEADLINE

All presentation submissions must be received no later than **DECEMBER 14, 2018**. Late or incomplete submissions will be ineligible for review.

II. SUBMISSION TYPE

A. **CATEGORY:** Please, designate your presentation to one of the following:

□ RESEARCH

Presentations must be focused on research that you have conducted, including the discovery of new knowledge, efficacy and effectiveness trials, or rigorous evaluation of programs or interventions. The goal is to bring new knowledge and understanding of at least one of the conference themes for attendees' own application within research or evidence-based practice.

• Please note that there are <u>no</u> poster presentations at this conference.

□ PRACTICE

Presentations must be focused on implementation of knowledge-, research- or evidence-based practice, such as initiatives, processes, projects, programs, education and/or interventions. The goal is to bring novel application of practice for attendees within one of the conference themes. Each presenter must provide attendees with a take-home application, such as a tool, a worksheet, an assessment or a program implementation plan.

		IGNITE <i>To arouse an interest and overview understanding of a topic</i> A 60-min session for 6 to 8 presentations. Each presentation is 5-minutes, with 20 slides that automatically advance every 15 seconds. The goal is for each presentation to be a concise, engaging and entertaining overview of the <i>Research</i> or <i>Practice</i> topic focused on at least one of the conference themes. The last 10-15 minutes of each session will allow for interaction with presenters and attendees.

		PRESENTER(S): Include all names, contact information and institutions.						
		'RESEARCH' SUMMARY: (300 word max)						
		• The <i>Research</i> abstract must be informative, including a statement of the study's specific PURPOSE, and include a brief BACKGROUND, METHODS, summary of RESULTS, and CONCLUSION. Please, use these headings in your submission.						
		Abstracts must include relevant data to substantiate all conclusions being drawn, or will result in rejection. Do not simply describe what was found (such as, "the education intervention group reduced their risk more than the control group"), or only present the statistical results with no other data (such as, "associations were significant at $p < .05$ ").

□ 'PRACTICE' SUMMARY: (300 word max) • The *Practice* summary must be information.

- The Practice summary must be informative, including a statement of the program/initiative's PURPOSE, and include a brief BACKGROUND, including any theoretical or research- and/or evidence-based underpinnings, an OVERVIEW of the practice/program details, and PRACTICAL APPLICATION. Please use these headings in your submission.
- Presenters must include what tangible take-home application will be left with the attendees (e.g., a tool, a worksheet, an assessment or a program implementation plan) to implement back in their own efforts.
- □ **LEARNING OBJECTIVES:** Provide three (3) learning objectives based on Bloom's Taxonomy (create, evaluate, analyze, apply, understand), and written in the proper format. For example:
 - "By the end of this presentation, the attendee will be able to identify the five key components to an effective environmental assessment of physical activity."
- □ **FUNDING:** Report the source of any funding received for the research or project. If no funding was received, please put "N/A".
- ☐ **CONFLICTS OF INTEREST:** Any conflicts of interest, including affiliations and/or financial interests that have a bearing on your abstract subject matter must be reported. If none, put "The authors report no conflicts of interest related to this presentation."
- ☐ **COMMITMENT:** By submitting your presentation proposal, you are agreeing to attend the conference at your own expense.

V. REVIEW PROCESS

Upon the deadline, a dedicated committee will review all submissions for acceptance to and placement within the conference schedule. Each proposed presenter will be notified of (1) whether or not the submission was accepted or not, and (2) the designated session type, day and time.

The rubric the committee will use to review and score each submission (Research and Practice, respectively) are provided on the following pages.
